## Official Papers

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### Who needs a residence permit?

Apart from citizens from the Nordic countries, everyone staying in Denmark for more than three months needs to have a residence permit.

**EU/EEA or Swiss citizens:** Students from the Nordic countries do not need a residence permit. EU nationals and citizens of Switzerland and Liechtenstein only need a residence permit if their stay exceeds three months. **The permit must be obtained upon arrival in Denmark**, which you will receive more information on upon arrival to Copenhagen.

**Non-EU/EEA citizens** staying in Denmark for more than three months must fill in the ST1 Form in order to apply for a residence permit. The form is to be sent to the nearest Danish embassy, consulate general or consulate. In certain countries, another Schengen country will handle visa applications on behalf of Denmark. If you submit your application to a diplomatic mission (embassy or consulate general) you will normally also have to pay a fee. The fee can vary in price. The Immigration Service recommends that you check the fee on the website of the diplomatic mission before submitting your application.

The processing of your application is up to **60 days** after the Danish Immigration Service has registered **receipt of the full application fee** and has received a **complete application** from you, **so do not hesitate; apply for your residence permit immediately to make sure that you will receive your residence permit in due time before your departure to Denmark.**

**All students** should check that the exchange period stated on the acceptance letter as well as the ST1 form (non-EU nationals) correspond and are correct. If you are a full year student, the full period of study should then be stated. If there are any problems with birth dates or the

exchange period, please contact the International Office immediately so we can send you a new copy of the documents.

### **Civil Personal Registration Number**

This is better known as the CPR number. Danish law states that once you have your residence permit, you must apply for the CPR number in order to stay in Denmark (Except Nordic citizens staying in Denmark less than 6 months). The number is issued by Municipal Citizen Service Centers called "Borgerservice".

The CPR number is used in all aspects of life in Denmark, such as when in contact with the health authorities, libraries, banks, etc. If you later in life return to e.g. study a full degree in Denmark, the authorities re-activate your CPR number.

As soon as you have the number, please e-mail it to the International Office – your CPR number is used for your exams and transcript at CBS.

### **How to Apply for a CPR Number**

The municipality you live in determines what "Borgerservice" Center you belong to. If you live in CBS housing, just read on and you find out where to go. As soon as you have received your residence permit (non EU-citizens have the permit already), you should go to the center bringing:

- An "Entry Form" which you will receive from CBS in your welcome package
- Your passport and a copy of the photo page in your passport
- Your residence permit and a copy of your residence permit
- Your rental agreement.

You will also be asked to choose a doctor from a list of doctors in your area. The CPR number will be sent to you after some weeks.

**Travelling during the Semester**

In case your family needs to get in touch with you urgently, please e-mail your contact details when travelling to [travel.intoff@cbs.dk](mailto:travel.intoff@cbs.dk). The mail box is only checked in case of emergencies and is deleted at semester's end.

**Semester Dates**

For information on semester dates and holidays, please see the "Academic Calendar" at [www.cbs.dk/intl](http://www.cbs.dk/intl). Do not book your ticket home until you are completely sure of the dates of your last exam.

**Courses and Timetables**

You find this information on [www.e-campus.dk](http://www.e-campus.dk). The log-on for the portal is your CBS e-mail user name and password. Under the section "Study", you can see your course enrollment and, when the time comes, what exams you are enrolled in. It is important that you check the timetables for your courses as soon as possible as time conflicts may occur. In case this happens, you have to change into another course.

**How to Read the Time Table**

You can see your personal schedule at [www.calendar.cbs.dk](http://www.calendar.cbs.dk) (Please use your e-mail login). The schedule will be available in the end of June (fall semester) and mid-December (spring semester). Once your courses have

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been assigned, we will provide you with more thorough guidelines on how to check your schedule for overlapping courses. Week numbers are used in the time tables, so it will for example say that a lecture starts in week 36 which in 2011 corresponds to September 5-11. For an overview of locations, please see map on page 11.

### Changing a Course

During the first two weeks of the semester, you are able to change courses at the International Office.

### Confirmation of Courses

Before the two first weeks of the semester are up, you have to confirm your choice of courses by handing in a "Final Course Registration form". The form will be available at the International Office. Even if you have made no changes to your program and you have all the courses you chose at the time when you sent in your registration form, you still have to fill in and sign a form. **The form will eventually be used when making your transcript – so make sure to hand it in!**

### Exams

Exam enrollment is automatically done in the courses you are enrolled in. This is done from around a month-two weeks before the exam. The exam enrollments will appear in your status on [www.e-campus.dk](http://www.e-campus.dk) under "Exam Enrollment Status". In case you change courses during the first two weeks of the semester, please check that you have not been enrolled for the exam in the course you have dropped, as a small number of courses have exam enrollment right at the start of the semester. Any question in regards to the exam enrollment, you should ask to the course secretary, as the International Office does not have anything to do with the exam enrollment.

### Special Needs Exam Arrangements

If you are a student with special needs, please ask the International Office about exam procedures at the beginning of the semester.

**Cancelling an Exam**

Please check e-campus for information on procedures and deadlines. If in doubt, or if you have exams with time conflicts, please come see us at the International Office.

**Grades and Transcripts**

The professor has minimum 30 days to mark the exam, and afterwards the mark has to be entered into our administrative system. Once this has been done, you can see your exam result on [www.e-campus.dk](http://www.e-campus.dk). When all exchange students have been given their exam results, the International Office makes the transcripts. We send two transcripts to your home university and you can pick it up there (if you are a Freemover, we do not send a transcript to your university, but to your home address). In case you need the transcript early for graduating, please contact us. Before you go home, we will check with you that we have your correct home address.

**Student ID**

During the Introduction week, you are taken to the CBS library to have an ID card made. Apart from being a student card, it also functions as a library card for the CBS library as well as a CBS cash card that makes it possible to use it for printing and for purchases in the canteen. **You cannot go to the exam without your student ID card.** It is free to have made, but if you lose it, you will have to pay to have a new one made.

Be aware if you receive an e-mail that appears to be from the IT counselors, asking you to confirm your password. This is a phishing-attack, and you should never e-mail your password to anybody.

### Information Centre at CBS

The Information Centre at CBS is located at Solbjerg Plads Campus. The centre is able to answer your questions regarding locations, departments or other CBS related issues. Opening hours is Mon-Thurs 7.45am-4.30pm, Fri 7.45am-4pm. Tel: 3815 4200.

## Medical Treatment

When you reside in Denmark and hold a valid CPR number, you are entitled to free medical treatment from a general doctor and free emergency treatment and hospitalization amongst other things but please make certain that you are covered by a health insurance in your own country until your Danish health insurance is valid. We also require you to have an insurance that covers home transport as well as liability in case of severe illness or death.

## Doctors

When you apply for your CPR number, you are asked to choose a doctor from a list. Approximately two weeks after you have registered you will receive your Yellow National Health Card to your Danish address. Always carry the card with you. The name and telephone number of your doctor is at the top of the card. If you need to make an appointment, telephone hours are generally between 8am and 9am. Be aware that it may take many attempts to get through to your doctor, and you may therefore spend up to 10-15 minutes of re-dialing. You need to bring the card with you to the doctor, otherwise you have to pay a service fee, which is non-refundable.

In case you need to see a doctor before you have the yellow card, you may contact this one: Inga Schlosser, Finsensvej 3, 1<sup>st</sup> floor to the left. Tel: 3888 8005. There is a fee of some hundred DKK per consultation. Check with your insurance company, if this is reimbursable.

## Emergency Doctor Service

If you live in Copenhagen or Frederiksberg and need a doctor outside normal consultation hours or during the weekend, you need to call the Emergency Doctor Service at tel: 7013 0041. A doctor will assess the state of your illness, and if he/she deems it necessary, you will be asked to come to an on-duty clinic/hospital or he/she will arrange a home visit.

## Health & Emergencies

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### Emergency Dental Treatment

For emergency dental treatment outside office hours, you can go to the Dental Emergency Service (Tandlægevagten) Oslo Plads 14, near Østerport Station. The treatment has to be paid for in cash or by Dancard, but all patients receive a subsidy upon presentation of the yellow health insurance card. If you are able to wait until a regular dentist opens, this is highly recommended as the emergency treatment is very expensive.

Open 7 days a week 8pm-9.30pm including weekends and public holidays 10am-noon. Dec 24 and Dec 31, only 9am-2pm.

## Mobile Phones

You will find it almost impossible to do without a cell phone while in Denmark. It is a great way to keep in touch with your new friends.

If you have brought a phone, it has to be SIM-unlocked and should work with GSM 900 and 1800/triband networks, in order to be used here.

Copenhagen has a lot of different companies that offer great deals, where you can buy more minutes online with international credit cards. This is the option that most Danish students choose.

You may also want to buy a new (SIM-unlocked) phone in Denmark, and then get the same kind of deal as mentioned above. You can get a new phone from around 600 DKK.

For students staying here for more than 6 months, you may want to look into getting a subscription. A subscription is for a minimum of 6 months and you need a Danish CPR number in order to sign up for one.

For a thorough explanation of your options, please go to one of the many mobile phone shops in Copenhagen. The closest one to CBS is located on the first floor in the Frederiksberg shopping centre by Solbjerg Plads Campus.

## Money, Banks and Credit Cards

The Danish currency is the "*kroner*" (crown); 1 "*kroner*" equals 100 "*øre*". A "kroner" is abbreviated "kr." or "DKK". Coins in the following denominations are in circulation: 50 øre, 1 kroner, 2 kroner, 5 kroner, 10 kroner and 20 kroner. In addition, we have 50 kroner, 100 kroner, 200 kroner, 500 kroner, and 1000 kroner notes. 1 EURO is a little more than DKK 7.

### Bank Accounts

In order to open a bank account in a Danish bank, you need to have a CPR number. The 2 largest banks in Denmark are Danske Bank and Nordea.

### Cash Machines / ATM

These are found outside almost all banks as well as in shopping centres. Please note that you normally pay a fee when withdrawing money from your account card. Check the fees for with your credit card company.

### Money Orders

You can have your parcels from home sent to the International Office. As soon as we receive it, we will send you an e-mail, so you can come to the office in order to pick it up. Please bring some kind of ID with you. Please make sure that your name is clearly stated on any parcels sent to the International Office.

A haircut is DKK50. Highlights, coloring and perms are DKK100. Light cosmetic treatments are between DKK50-250. Expect to spend some extra time there, as those doing the work are students and their work has to be viewed and judged.

## Free newspapers in English

The Copenhagen Post is the Danish news in English. It is published once a week. You can pick up a copy from the International Office, or you can read it at [www.cphpost.dk](http://www.cphpost.dk)

The CBS Observer is the CBS newspaper. Part of it is in English. It is published once a month and can be picked up from our office.

## Book Swap

If you have read your books and need "new" ones, you can swap books at the International Office. We have a selection of books in English (mainly fiction) which you are more than welcome to look through.

## Supermarkets

Supermarkets are found on most main streets in Frederiksberg and Copenhagen. Some are pricier than others, so shopping in discount supermarkets is a good way of saving money. Please be aware that **some supermarkets do not take international credit cards**, so check before shopping.

Discount supermarkets are Aldi, Fakta, Netto and Lidl.

Ordinary supermarkets are Føtex, Kvickly, SuperBrugsen and SuperBest.

Irma is also a supermarket, but its carefully selected goods can sometimes be a bit pricey.

Most bottles are recycled in Denmark. You pay a small deposit when you buy your soft drink or beer, and when you bring the empty bottle back to a supermarket, you put it into the bottle recycling machine. You get the deposit returned when you present your receipt to the till assistant.

## General Opening Hours

Large supermarkets like Føtex, Kvickly, Netto, Fakta close at 8pm on weekdays.

On Saturdays, they close at 4 or 5pm. On Sunday, most shops are closed, apart from kiosks, bakeries and a few smaller supermarkets. On the first Sunday of the month, many shops and supermarkets are open.

## Getting around Town

A very popular way of getting around in Copenhagen is by bicycle. Most Danish students use the bike as their main means of transportation. However, if you are not a regular cyclist and do not feel confident on a bike, you should not make an attempt at being a first-time-cyclist in Copenhagen. Some car drivers and cyclists drive recklessly with little regard for other people or traffic regulations. One of the most typical accidents happen at traffic crossings, when lorry drivers and car drivers turn to either the left or the right and overlook cyclists, who are going straight ahead. It is recommended to wear a bicycle helmet.

### The City Bike

City Bike is a system by which you can use a specially designed bicycle to ride around in the inner city. You collect a bicycle from one of the 100 City Bike racks by depositing a 20 kroner coin in the bicycle, and you get your money back, when you return the bike to a rack. Please note that there is a DKK1,000 fine if the City Bike is taken out of the Inner City. Please see [www.bycyklen.dk](http://www.bycyklen.dk) for more information.

## Transportation

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Please check [www.topauktioner.dk](http://www.topauktioner.dk) for dates and times. You may have to get your buddy to help you at the site, as everything is in Danish. Only cash and the Danish credit card Dankort can be used as payment at the auction.

Used bicycles are also often sold by other students. Check CBS notice boards and on [www.e-campus.dk](http://www.e-campus.dk). After you have logged on, you look for the "Buy & Sell" section.

### **New Bicycles**

You may also want to buy a new bike. Large supermarkets like Bilka, Føtex and SuperBrugsen carry bicycles, and prices range from around DKK1000 and up.

### **Bicycle Lights**

You are required to have lights on your bicycle from sunset to sunrise. If not, you will get fined DKK500, if you come across the police. A set of bicycle lights can be bought in most supermarkets for around DKK50.

## **Public Transport**

### **Buses and Metro**

The city has an efficient public transport system which runs 24 hours a day. Getting from CBS to the Inner City by Metro takes 3 minutes. Tickets for the Metro are also valid on the bus or S-train (local trains), as long as you have bought the right amount of zones.

The ticket fare depends on how many zones you are going through. A standard ticket covers 2 zones and costs DKK24. If you are going by public transport on a regular basis, you might consider buying a 10-trip card or even a monthly card.

### **Tickets for Local and National Public Transport**

Tickets and cards for public transport including national trains can be purchased at the DSB Ticket Sale Counter at Frederiksberg Shopping Center (on the ground floor near the centre's information booth).

### **Taxis**

You can hail one in the street, check to see if the "Fri" sign in the front wind screen is illuminated. You can also call Taxi 4x35 at tel: 3535 3535. Taxis can be expensive in Denmark.

### **How to Get from A to B**
