Residence Permit

All students living in Denmark for more than three months need a residence permit (except for students from the Nordic Countries). For information about work permits, please see the Survival Guide on: www.cbs.dk/istudents

Non-EU nationals must have applied for their residence permit before arriving in Denmark. If you have not received your permit, please come and see us at the International Office straight away.

Important: EU Nationals, who are staying in **Københavns Kommune** (the Municipality of Copenhagen) and **Frederiksberg Kommune** (the Municipality of Frederiksberg), should apply for the residence permit at The International Office, where immigration officers will be present. Information about dates will be placed on E-campus when we know it.

If, however, for some reason, you miss this opportunity, here is the address, where you can get your permit:

Official Papers

Civil Personal Registration Number

This is better known as the CPR number. Danish law states that once you have your residence permit, you must apply for the CPR number in order to stay in Denmark. The number is issued by Municipal Citizen Service Centres called “Borgerservice”.

The CPR number is used in all aspects of life in Denmark, such as when in contact with the health authorities, libraries, banks, etc. If you later in life return to Denmark, the authorities re-activate your CPR number.

As soon as you have the number, please e-mail it to international.admission@cbs.dk – your CPR number is used for your exams and transcript at CBS.

How to Apply for a CPR Number

The municipality you live in, determines which “Borgerservice” Center you belong to. If you live in CBS housing, just read on and you can find out where to go. As soon as you have received your residence permit (non EU-citizens have the permit already), you should go to the center, bringing your passport, your residence permit and your rental agreement. You will also be asked to choose a doctor from a list of doctors in your area. The CPR number will be sent to you after some weeks.

You can find this information on www.e-campus.dk The log-on for the portal is your CBS e-mail user name and password. Under the section “Study”, you can see your course enrollment and, when the time comes, what exams you are enrolled in.

Since you are enrolled in a full time program, your first year almost always consists of fixed courses. If you have any problems contact your Program Secretary.

enclosed in your welcome package. Week numbers are used in the time tables, so it will for example say that a lecture starts in week 36 which in 2010 corresponds to September 7-13. For an overview of locations, please see map on page 11.

Changing a Course

Since you are enrolled in a full degree program the first year is based on mandatory courses.

Exams

Exam enrollment is automatically done in the courses you are enrolled in. This is done from around a month to two weeks before the exam. The exam enrollments will appear in your status on www.e-campus.dk under “Exam Enrollment Status”. In case you change courses during the first two weeks of the semester, please check that you have not been enrolled for the exam in the course you have dropped, as a small number of courses have exam enrollment right at the start of the semester. Any question in regards to the exam enrollment, you should ask to the course secretary, as the International Office does not have anything to do with the exam enrollment.

Special Needs Exam Arrangements

Cancelling an Exam

Please check e-campus for information on procedures and deadlines. If in doubt, or if you have exams with time conflicts, please check with your Program Secretary.

Grades and Transcripts

The professor has a minimum of 30 days to mark the exam, and afterwards the mark has to be entered into our administrative system. Once this has been done, you can see your exam result on www.e-campus.dk. Your final Diploma will be sent to you by mail after Graduation.

Student ID

During the Introduction week, you are taken to the CBS library to have an ID card made. Apart from being a student card, it also functions as a library card for the CBS library as well as a CBS cash card that makes it possible for it to be used for printing and for purchases in the canteen.

You cannot go to the exam without your student ID card. It is free to have made, but if you lose it, you will have to pay to have a new one made.

Some places give a student discount if you show your student ID.

Information and Slides from Lectures

We are using two different portals for information, Bachelor students starting 2010 will be using Learn, and Master students starting 2010 will be using SiteScape.

Once you have logged on to the Learn/SiteScape portal www.e-cbs.dk you have access to information about your courses, teaching slides as well as other information that the professor or course secretary may upload. For further information on SiteScape, please see the folder "Read Me" enclosed in your welcome package. There are also IT student guides available at Solbjerg Plads and Porcelænshaven.

CBS Libraries

Academic Books – New and Second Hand

CBS has academic bookstores at Dalgas Have and Solbjerg Plads. Books are quite expensive in Denmark as we pay VAT on them, but second hand books are sold at www.e-campus.dk. Please see the section “Buy & Sell”.

Health & Emergencies

Medical Treatment

When you reside in Denmark and hold a valid CPR number, you are entitled to free medical treatment from a general doctor and free emergency treatment and hospitalization amongst other things but please make certain that you are covered by a health insurance in your own country until your Danish health insurance is valid. We also require you to have an insurance that covers home transport as well as liability in case of severe illness or death.

Doctors

When you apply for your CPR number, you are asked to choose a doctor from a list. Approximately two weeks after you have registered you will receive your Yellow National Health Card to your Danish address. Always carry the card with you. The name and telephone number of your doctor is at the top of the card. If you need to make an appointment, telephone hours are generally between 8am and 9am. Be aware that it may take many attempts to get through to your doctor, and you may therefore spend up to 10-15 minutes of re-dialing. You need to bring the card with you to the doctor, otherwise you have to pay a service fee, which is non-refundable.

In case you need to see a doctor before you have the yellow card, you may contact this one: Inga Schlosser, Finsensvej 3, 1st floor to the left. Tel: 3888 8005. There is a fee of some hundred DKK per consultation. Check with your insurance company, if this is reimbursable.

Emergency Doctor Service

If you live in Copenhagen or Frederiksberg and need a doctor outside normal consultation hours or during the weekend, you need to call the Emergency Doctor Service at tel: 7013 0041. A doctor will assess the state of your illness, and if he/she deems it necessary, you will be asked to come to an on-duty clinic/hospital or he/she will arrange a home visit.

should call the emergency call center at 112 at any time.

This service is also free of charge as long as you have your yellow sygeskringsbevis.

Emergency Dental Treatment

For emergency dental treatment outside office hours, you can go to the Dental Emergency Service (Tandlægevagten) Oslo Plads 14, near Østerport Station. The treatment has to be paid for in cash or by Dancard (Danish Creditcard), but all patients receive a subsidy upon presentation of the yellow health insurance card. If you are able to wait until a regular dentist opens, this is highly recommended as the emergency treatment is very expensive.

Open 7 days a week 8pm-9.30pm including weekends and public holidays
10am-noon. Dec 24 and Dec 31, only 9am-2pm.

Stolen Property

If your property is stolen, you can file a report at your local police station. Call 114 for addresses and further information. Unfortunately, a number of students in previous semesters have been pick-pocketed either attending evening activities or shopping in town. If you have withdrawn a large sum of money and you do not want to carry it around, you are welcome to keep it at the safe at the International Office. You need to bring some ID when you retrieve the money again. The money can only be retrieved during regular opening hours. You may want to take out additional insurance that covers liability and personal belongings during your stay, **CBS cannot cover any losses which may occur.**

Mobile Phones

You will find it almost impossible to do without a cell phone while in Denmark. It is a great way to keep in touch with your new friends.

If you have brought a phone, it has to be SIM-unlocked and should work with GSM 900 and 1800/triband networks, in order to be used here.

Copenhagen has a lot of different companies that offer great deals, where you can buy more minutes online with international credit cards. This is the option that most Danish students choose.

You may also want to buy a new (SIM-unlocked) phone in Denmark, and then get the same kind of deal as mentioned above. You can get a new phone from around 600 DKK.

Since you are staying for more than 6 months, you may want to look into getting a subscription. A subscription is for a minimum of 6 months and you need a Danish CPR number in order to sign up for one.

For a thorough explanation of your options, please go to one of the many mobile phone shops in Copenhagen. The closest one to CBS is located on the first floor in the Frederiksberg shopping centre by Solbjerg Plads Campus.

Practicalities

Money, Banks and Credit Cards

The Danish currency is the "*krone*" (crown); 1 "*krone*" equals 100 "*øre*". A "*krone*" is abbreviated "kr." or "DKK". Coins in the following denominations are in circulation: 50 øre, 1 krone, 2 kroner, 5 kroner, 10 kroner and 20 kroner. In addition, we have 50 kroner, 100 kroner, 200 kroner, 500 kroner, and 1000 kroner notes. 1 EURO is a little more than DKK 7. Exchange rates can be found on the Internet at the following address, where you can also find a convenient program for the conversion of currency: www.oanda.com or www.xe.net

Bank Accounts

In order to open a bank account in a Danish bank, you need to have a CPR number. The 2 largest banks in Denmark are Danske Bank and Nordea.

Nem konto

If you are receiving a scholar ship, you will need a Nem-konto.

It is very important that you get the Nem-konto at your Danish Bank, as the first thing after getting your CPR number. We cannot pay out the scholar ship money to you if you don't have a Nem-konto.

Cash Machines / ATM

These are found outside all banks as well as in shopping centres.

Money Orders

These can be dispatched and received at all post offices. The money order always has to be made out in DKK. Western Union International Service offers instant outbound-inbound money transfer. Please see

Credit Cards

Most shops accept all major credit cards when shopping, **but a few do not**. Please note that among the shops that do not accept foreign credit cards, you find the large supermarket Føtex.

A haircut is DKK50. Highlights, colouring and perms are DKK100. Light cosmetic treatments are between DKK50-250. Expect to spend some extra time there, as those doing the work are students and their work has to be viewed and judged.

Free newspapers in English

The Copenhagen Post is the Danish news in English. It is published once a week. You can pick up a copy from the International Office, or you can read it at www.cphpost.dk

The CBS Observer is the CBS newspaper. Part of it is in English. It is published once a month and can be picked up from our office, or you can read it at <http://cbsobserver.dk>

Book Swap

If you have read your books and need “new” ones, you can swap books at the International Office. We have a selection of books in English (mainly fiction) which you are more than welcome to look through.

Shopping for Food

Supermarkets

Supermarkets are found on most main streets in Frederiksberg and Copenhagen. Some are pricier than others, so shopping in discount supermarkets is a good way of saving money. Please be aware that **some supermarkets do not take international credit cards**, so check before shopping.

Discount supermarkets are Aldi, Fakta, Netto and Lidl.

Ordinary supermarkets are Føtex, Kvickly, SuperBrugsen and SuperBest. Irma is also a supermarket, but its carefully selected goods can sometimes be a bit pricey.

Around Copenhagen there are also small ethnic stores with a variety of local spices and produce.

Most bottles are recycled in Denmark. You pay a small deposit (pant) when you buy your soft drink or beer, and when you bring the empty bottle back to a supermarket, you put it into the bottle recycling machine. You get the deposit returned when you present your receipt to the till assistant.

General Opening Hours

Large supermarkets like Føtex, Kvickly, Netto, Fakta close at 8pm on weekdays. On Saturdays, they close at 4 or 5pm. On Sunday, most shops are closed, apart from kiosks, bakeries and a few smaller supermarkets such as QuickFakta and DøgnNetto. On the first Sunday of the month, many shops and supermarkets are open.

Transportation

Getting around Town

A very popular way of getting around in Copenhagen is by bicycle. Most Danish students use the bike as their main means of transportation. However, if you are not a regular cyclist and do not feel confident on a bike, you should not make an attempt at being a first-time-cyclist in Copenhagen. Some car drivers and cyclists drive recklessly with little regard for other people or traffic regulations. One of the most typical accidents happens at traffic crossings, when lorry drivers and car drivers turn to either the left or the right and overlook cyclists, who are going straight ahead. It is recommended to wear a bicycle helmet.

The City Bike

City Bike is a system by which you can use a specially designed bicycle to ride around in the inner city. You collect a bicycle from one of the 100 City Bike racks by depositing a 20 kroner coin in the bicycle, and you get your money back, when you return the bike to a rack. Please note that there is a DKK1,000 fine if the City Bike is taken out of the Inner City. Please see www.bycyklen.dk for more information.

Transportation

Please check www.topauktioner.dk for dates and times. You may have to get a Danish person to help you at the site, as everything is in Danish. Only cash and the Danish credit card Dankort can be used as payment at the auction.

Used bicycles are also often sold by other students. Check CBS notice boards and on www.e-campus.dk After you have logged on, look for the “Buy & Sell” section.

New Bicycles

You may also want to buy a new bike. Large supermarkets like Bilka, Føtex and SuperBrugsen carry bicycles, and prices ranges from around DKK1000 and up.

Bicycle Lights

You are required to have lights on your bicycle from sunset to sunrise. If not, you will get fined DKK500, if you come across the police. A set of bicycle lights can be bought in most supermarkets for around DKK50.

Public Transport

Buses and Metro

The city has an efficient public transport system which runs 24 hours a day. Getting from CBS to the Inner City by Metro takes 3 minutes. Tickets for the Metro are also valid on the bus or S-train (local trains), as long as you have bought the right amount of zones.

The ticket fare depends on how many zones you are going through. A standard ticket covers 2 zones and costs DKK23.. If you are going by public transport on a regular basis, you might consider buying a 10-trip card or even a monthly card.

Transportation

Tickets for Local and National Public Transport

Tickets and cards for public transport including national trains can be purchased at the DSB Ticket Sale Counter at Frederiksberg Shopping Center (on the ground floor near the centre’s information booth).

The 10-trip cards can also be purchase at some Kiosks or Supermarkets.

Taxis

You can hail one in the street, check to see if the “Fri” sign in the front wind screen is alluminated . You can also call Taxa Motor at tel: 3535 3535. Taxis can be expensive in Denmark.

How to Get from A to B

If you need to find out how to get from one address to another by public transport, you can use the journey planner at www.rejseplanen.dk, which provides you with a full description of the journey including timetables, prices and maps.
