BOOK PROJECT	<i>Varieties of Globalization: Trade Openness, Bank Lobbying, and the Political Economy of Financial Liberalization</i> . In my dissertation, I explore how government choices about trade shape domestic banks’ lobby for financial liberalization. Governments are	

more likely to face pressures from domestic banks on financial market policies when the country is already heavily integrated into international trade. At the same time, the direction of bank lobbying for financial liberalization – whether to retain capital controls or remove them and integrate into global markets – depends on the degree of rents banks currently receive from the government.
